Sidmouth welcomes you, as always, to another great Festival, worthy of its place in history and its Blue Plaque. Enjoy every moment and keep coming back year after year!



All Saints Hall

The venue for afternoon dance workshops and evening Family Shows (Saturday plus Monday to Wednesday). All Saints Road. Wheelchair access.

Arts Centre

Morning and early evening Talks. Daily Shooting Roots and Stream of Sound events for 12-18 years.

Anchor Inn & Garden

FolkWeek events are centred on the Garden to the rear of the pub. Access is to the left of the pub building. Ceilidhs every lunchtime and late afternoon, with bands, singers and other entertainment through to the late evening. There is no entrance charge, although there is a collection: please give generously to the collectors. The pub also hosts fringe events — the Middle Bar Singers upstairs and music sessions inside the pub. Old Fore Street. Wheelchair access to the Garden, but a flight of stairs to the upstairs room.

Bedford Hotel

Concerts in the dining room, fringe events in the bars. Esplanade. Access is via three steps. A wheelchair ramp is available from the hotel management.

Blackmore Gardens

The town-based heart of the Festival, and home to the Children's Festival events. The Blackmore Gardens Marquee is the venue for morning social dance workshops, afternoon dance displays and evening ceilidhs. Other marquees are used by the Children's Festival. The Music Fair has a variety of instruments, books and DVDs. Outdoor entertainment is based on or near an open-air stage. There is a bar in the Gardens Marquee. The Blackmore caterers serve food and drinks all day; there's also ice cream and fresh fruit drinks. Access from Blackmore Drive or through the parish churchyard. Wheelchair access over grass.

Bulverton Campsite

Bulverton Marquee

Evening Roots Music gigs, Late Night Extra ceilidhs plus morning workshops. Food and a bar + Early Bird Special prices between 7pm and 8pm! Live Music from 7pm - why not make an evening of it with a Big Gig ticket? Betsy's Lounge is a post-Late Night Extra space for early hours relaxation, playing and singing. There are new lunchtime Open Mic sessions at the weekend, aimed at young singer songwriters. New this year is a secure instrument store for those who wish to play at early evening sessions and at Betsy's Lounge after Bulverton events have finished. Situated just opposite the Festival car park (for directions, see Festival Parking) on the way from the Festival car park to the Campsite bus stop. Alternatively there is access by foot from Station Road (B3176) opposite the Campsite.

Dukes

The hotel's seafront forecourt is a venue for live music. Esplanade. Wheelchair access.

Esplanade: Bedford Steps

A performance space on the Esplanade. Dance teams are programmed throughout the day with opportunities for visiting dance groups and acoustic musicians. See A Boards on site for available times.

Esplanade: York Steps

A performance space on the Esplanade. Dance teams are programmed throughout the day with opportunities for visiting dance groups and acoustic musicians. See A Boards on site for available times.

The Hub

The Hub is a performance centre for the Festival, centred on the Ham and Port Royal area at the eastern end of the Esplanade. It includes the Ham Concert Marquee, the Ham Lawn and Port Royal. The road from Ham Lane and the Lifeboat Station to Port Royal is pedestrianised, although there is access for emergency and service vehicles. Wheelchair access over grass. Public toilets at Port Royal, including facilities for disabled persons.

Ham Concert Marquee – Lunchtime, afternoon and evening concerts. Foyer Bar. Dedicated toilets for concert patrons, including disabled feelilities.

Ham Lawn – Festival Merchandise and artists' CD stall. Main Festival Food and drink outlets. Undercover seating and bar area with picnic benches.

Port Royal – Pedestrianised area. Daily programme of dance displays, choirs and street theatre.

Festival Box Office – Near the swimming pool and Tourist Information Centre.

Carinas

Concerts and Song events three times a day including afternoon *fRoots* 'Cellar Full of Folkadelia'. New this Year, access is through New Tavern entrance in Fore Street, not from Market Square. Carinas FolkWeek Bar is open all day so you're welcome to get pre-show drinks at any time. The bar in Carinas itself will be open before and during the concerts. Limited disabled access via Carinas entrance off Market Square.

Kingswood & Devoran Hotel-The Kingswood Room

Used for instrumental workshops and informal evening "folk club" style evenings. The Kingswood and Devoran Hotel is on the Esplanade between Dukes and The Bedford Hotel. It is at the back of the hotel and will be signed from the hotel patio. Disabled access is from the back of the hotel and will be signed.

Manor Pavilion

Afternoon and evening concerts and morning workshops. Corner of Manor Road and Station Road. Wheelchair access.

Methodist Church

The Church is used for daytime workshops and some evening concerts. The Methodist Church Hall is used for folk dances and workshops. The Lower Methodist Hall is used for workshops. High Street, close to Blackmore Drive (which leads to Blackmore Gardens). Lift into the Church and Upper Hall. Level access to the Hall. Short flight of stairs to the Lower Hall.

Peacock Lawn

Home of the Official Craft Village, immediately next door to Blackmore Gardens. Peacock Lawn plays host to over 25 craft stands and a café.

Rugby Club

First floor room used for a variety of workshops and sessions. Heydon's Lane. Access up stairs.

Sidmouth C of E Primary School (Vicarage Road)

Used for Dance and Music workshops in the School Hall and Instrumental and Song workshops in the Classroom.

Stowford Rise Community Centre

Stowford Rise Čommunity Centre is located adjacent to the Waitrose supermarket on the edge of town. If driving from the town centre continue out of town up Temple Street and then fork left at Exeter Cross towards Woolbrook, drive past Lidl and St Nicholas school then turn right up Stowford Rise. As the road levels off with Waitrose on the left, the centre can be found on your right in Chambers Close. Centre has a sign opposite the Waitrose car park entrance. There is a small car park.

St Teresa's Church Hall

Used for dance events, workshops and evening folk dances. It is on Vicarage Road, north of the Radway Cinema, with the entrance at the back of the hall. Wheelchair access is available at the main entrance off Connaught Road (there is a ramp). Alternatively, when the doors are open, there is access directly from Vicarage Road. Disabled toilet

Unitarian Hall

Used for Children's Festival workshops. Corner of All Saints Road and High Street. Level access, but narrow doorways.

Volunteer Inn





FolkWeek Fringe

FolkWeek Fringe

Sidmouth's "Festival Fringe" is a part of the FolkWeek experience, complementing the main Festival but not organised by it, so not responsible for what takes place – but many enjoy participating, or just taking in the atmosphere.

All Fringe events are free – but make a collection for the Festival. If you are having a good time, please drop a pound coin or two into the Collection tin now and then.

Here is a rough guide of what goes on, plus places where things could happen:

Song sessions

Middle Bar Singers: Upstairs at the Anchor to drink, laugh and sing. Unaccompanied singarounds are from 12.30-3pm and 8-11pm each day, starting on Thursday, the day before the Festival officially starts. Tuesday evening is usually a shanty fundraiser for Sidmouth Lifeboat and Thursday pm the singers jump into the sea and carry on singing: opposite the Bedford Hotel at 3pm.

Royal York and Faulkner Hotel – Faulkner Bar: Kitty Vernon & Tim Edwards' morning singaround, 10.30am-12.30pm from Sunday.

Faulkner Bar: Come All Ye with Taff Brissenden and Dave & Julia Taylor from 7.30pm daily. Plus "Gloom, Doom and Despondency" Competition – Thursday at 4.30pm.

Esplanade Shelter: West Gallery Music sessions from Monday to Thursday, 1-2pm (Sunday 11-12pm). Opposite Bedford Lawn Car Park.

New Tavern: Mixed session of song, music, dance and stories with Gerry Milne and friends.

Music sessions

Anchor Inn: In the main bar (street level).

Bedford Hotel Bar: A mixture of music and song. From Friday all day, every day.

Sailing Club: Usually a tune-around session from about 8pm onwards, starting Saturday.

Swan Inn: music sessions all day. **Radway Inn:** English music session lunchtimes and evenings, starting Friday.

Dance

On the Esplanade outside the Royal York and Faulkner Hotel.

Wild Thyme Border Morris (with Sue White) is for all, including complete beginners: 11am-noon starting Monday.

Herbaceous Border (with Kurt Sauter) for more experienced dancers, preferably in kit: 6-7pm starting Sunday. Musicians welcome for each group.

Street Performers

Please note that licensing arrangements and street closures for FolkWeek limit use of the Market Square in particular, and unprogrammed performers could be moved on.

Looking for somewhere to perform?

There are 2 large Festival Performance spaces on the Esplanade at York Steps and opposite the Bedford Hotel. Apart from scheduled sessions by Festival dance teams, if you play acoustically, sing or dance, please make use of the opportunity these spaces provide.

Dukes has Open Mic sessions from 11.00am, also try the Black Horse or Volunteer in the afternoons and evenings.

Collections

Sidmouth FolkWeek Ltd (Registered Charity 1111958) has obtained the street licence from East Devon District Council to collect in Sidmouth during FolkWeek. Street collections from performances are an important part of FolkWeek's income. If you are busking as musicians, singers

or a dance team, please register your name and collect an official tin or bucket from Collections Office in the Festival Centre, Sidmouth C of E Primary School, Vicarage Road just above the Radway cinema, on the opposite side of the road. Tins or buckets can be collected and retuned between the hours of 9.30am and 6pm, or up to 8pm by special arrangement with the Collections Office. Please make sure that all tins are returned by 6pm on the last Friday evening, prior to the Torchlight Procession.

Important: Please collect buckets for the Torchlight Procession from the Collections Office by 7pm. After the procession please return the buckets to the rendezvous point on Bedford Lawn car park.

The Bill Rutter Collections Awards

Bill Rutter. Sidmouth Festival Director from 1961-79, encouraged everyone to participate and become part of the Festival team. The Festival has a long tradition of busking from all kinds of musicians, dancers, singers and artists. There are two Bill Rutter Awards, the Dance Teams trophy which began in 2013 and is keenly contested and a second for musicians/singers. They are awarded to the team, venue or performer collecting the highest amount during the week. The presentations will take place during LNE at the Bulverton Marquee around midnight on the final Friday.

Volunteers

An integral part of Sidmouth Folk Week are our volunteers, and we massively value their contributions before, during and after the week.

Volunteering roles include staffing the box offices, venue stewarding, charity collecting, helping at the Children's Festival, (wo)manning the Campsite and many more...

In return for 5 hours a day, Volunteers get a Week Ticket, free camping, a special Festival Volunteer T-shirt, food discounts, subsidised Festival bus travel and hopefully new friends and experiences.

Collection of pre-booked tickets

All-In-One, All-In-One Weekend, Bulverton-In-One, Week, Weekend, Day and Camping ticket purchasers will be sent a receipt which is then exchanged for tickets on arrival in Sidmouth. The receipt shows which collection point you have chosen: Festival Box Office or Campsite. On the day of arrival, if the appropriate Box Office is closed, a Season Ticket receipt itself can be used to gain access to events.

If requested, **Advance Event Tickets** purchased before 17th July will have been posted to the address you gave when booking; otherwise they will be held at the Festival Box Office, or Campsite Reception, as per your selection when booking. From 17th July onwards, they will be held for collection at the Tourist Information Centre (TIC) until 4.00pm on 30th July, and from 31st July at the Festival Box Office. Event tickets purchased online from 17th July onwards can be collected from the Festival Box Office from 31st July. Tickets not collected up to 1 hour before the event can be collected at the venue. (The collection point for Ham Marquee events is the Festival Box Office).

All-In-One Tickets give admission to all Festival events including Ham Marquee Evening Concerts. They do not give entry to the Pre-Festival shows on Thursday 3rd or Friday 4th August, but you can get a discount. Priority entry to all events (just arrive at least 10 minutes before the event start) subject to capacity. Separate campsite charges apply.

All-In-One Weekend Tickets have the same conditions, for the relevant days, as the All-In-One Tickets above. The Weekend Ticket covers Friday to Sunday.
